

As the dark winter evenings descend upon us, we can look forward to a varied programme of tasks to keep us busy until the New Year. Details on the back page.

The last CROW outing was an attack on the Japanese Knotweed on the Kennet towpath on 2nd September. Despite some fairly traumatic transport problems, the day went very well, with a large area of Knotweed being cleared.

The large growth of nettles that bordered the towpath was also cut down, with time for the customary CROW walk at lunchtime, which meandered its way upstream in search of an elusive Kingfisher without much success.

The cut Knotweed was loaded into a convenient council dustcart, to be taken away for incineration, the only effective method of disposal for this most tenacious of plants.

The root systems are to be sprayed in the near future, again the only effective means of ensuring the total removal of the plant.

This was part of a programme of path clearance work currently underway along this entire length of the River Kennet, extending into the Southcote Water Meadows and will hopefully provide us with some good tasks in the New Year.




