Ordnance Survey grid reference




This symbol indicates where the minibus is most likely to be parked, if making your own way, find the bus and follow arrows from there.



# OCTOBER 1997




We will be felling sycamore trees which have invaded an area of the wood.




We will be working on the old pond in Oldpond Copse.


We will be clearing Scots Pine trees which have invaded the heathland, these will be sold as environmentally friendly Xmas Trees. A free tree for every volunteer!















Returning to Marshland Square we will continue felling sycamore trees which have invaded an area of the wood.

# THE RESULTS OF THE CROW DESIGN A T-SHIRT COMPETITION!







Design 1. 'Reservoir Crows'

1. When undertaking a serious bout of conservation never dress down.


2. Gentlemen should wear uncomfortable and constricting ties about their necks.
