

The name of the site on which we will be working


Ordnance Survey grid reference

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


BONFIRE TASK


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


We will be installing a number of different types of bird and bat boxes up trees in this woodland, we will also do some coppicing (not on the same trees).




This is a small triangular site alongside the At opposite Prospect Park, we will be working on a section of the hedge.






We will be felling invasive sycamore trees to open up a coppiced area of the woodland. Some of the trees will be large. Chain saw operators welcome.




Each year Caversham Court Environment Centre sell 'Environmentally Friendly' Christmas trees, these are Scots pine which are removed from heathlands as part of their restoration. Proceeds from the sales are divided amongst local conservation groups including CROW. This week we will be felling pine trees and delivering them to the Environment Centre. 




How do you get everybody across the bridge?



IN 1972 A CRACK CONSERVATION UNIT WAS SENT TO CAVERSHAM COURT FOR AN ECO-NET MEETING THEY DID NOT COMMIT. THEY PROMPTLY ESCAPED FROM A MAXIMUM SECURITY TOOLSHED INTO THE READING UNDERGROWTH. TODAY STILL WANTED BY THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES, THEY SURVIVE MAINLY ON HOB NOBS. IF YOU HAVE AN ENVIRONMENTAL PROBLEM, IF NO ONE ELSE CAN HELP, AND IF YOU CAN FIND THEM, MAYBE YOU CAN HIRE:











Early in the Summer of 1998 a new and more dangerous plot was being hatched by the Newt Liberation Front. This was no small operation involving only a few lonely newts; it was a mission of epic proportions. It all started when it was brought to the attention of the NFL's intrepid leader that a vast population of newts was under threat from developers. This prime newt site had established in the grounds of a derelict house, which had bean earmarked for a development that would leave no room for some murky old ponds. And so the CROW task force was called into action....

Nets, buckets, jugs and bins were all required in order to retrieve the citizens living in the threatened ponds. It was soon realised that it wasn't just thousands of newts in danger, there was a thriving metropolis that included several minority groups: frogs, fish, tadpoles and some rather vicious looking invertebrates that verged on the antisocial. The NFL is however a very open-minded group, so compassion was shown and these too were rescued in the makeshift tanks and containers.


It soon became clear that many individuals might be missed without a thorough evacuation of the ponds. It was therefore decided that the best course of action was to totally drain the ponds. When the sophisticated garden-hose siphon system failed, the old fashioned bailing technique was employed. This was of course at great risk to all other members of the task force and any wildlife unlucky enough to be scooped up in a bail. It may have seemed like a dangerous procedure but was eventually completed without too many casualties.

When the Caversham site was first identified there was no way of knowing the sheer numbers involved and as a consequence the scale of the operation was initially underestimated. To gain a full appreciation of the numbers, the recently developed Noyes Technique (patent applied for) was implemented. Details of this are top secret at present but it can be disclosed that through a complex series of calculations an ordinary kitchen measuring jug can be calibrated with 20 newts to calculate the total number of newts. The results of this indicated an exact possible estimate of 457 newts retrieved from the ponds.

It has to be said that the newts and co. were not entirely happy about the confinement in our not-so-spacious tanks. The overcrowding was particularly unbearable, especially for the newts. This situation was however only a temporary discomfort to be endured for a better future. And that future was to be in the wilderness that is Caversham Park Pond. This part of the operation was perhaps the most dangerous element of the mission. The CROW all-terrain-super-van was nearly drawn into the violent waters of the duckpond, it was only with fearless piloting that it fought the battle and remained on shore. When the vehicle was finally brought under control the threatened wildlife could be set free. In an emotional ceremony the newts and their pals scurried over the banks of the pond to begin their new lives.

For security reasons the exact release locations will remain secret, but we understand all concerned are making a brilliant recovery and should be just about ready to overwinter in their newfound sanctuary.

NB for your own safety this sort of operation should not be undertaken without expert guidance.




